

CONTEMPORARY PRINTS FROM

FRANCE III

AN INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE EXHIBIT SPONSORED BY THE MEMORIAL UNION OREGON STATE UNIVERSITY, CORVALLIS

P OR THE THIRD TIME Oregon State University has assembled a major collection of original Contemporary Prints from France for exhibition throughout the United States. Two hundred prints by more than a hundred French artists have already been shown to the American public during the last ten years. Now fifty new names appear in "France III."

The selection of prints for the present exhibit, made in Paris by Dr. Gordon W. Gilkey, is very revealing. Not only do French and foreign artists living in France, working in a variety of aesthetic directions, share equal attention but more than half of the artists are age thirty to forty.

Strong in a five centuries old tradition, Prontinues to affirm herself as one of the mactive centers of printmaking. Her ateliers are justly famous. For forty years, artists from around the world have come to Paris to study the techniques of copperplate engraving with Stanley William Hayter, veritable pioneer of contemporary engraving. Johnny Friedlaender, master of aquatint, for nearly twenty years has been teaching the art of etching. More than twenty-five of the present exhibitors are or have been associated with one of these two masters.

No less renowned are the ateliers of the Parisian copperplate and lithographic printers. In them the abstract, surrealist or figurative painters and sculptors often have achieved distinction as printmakers and have become "des habitués de la maison." To be convinced of this, one needs only to listen to artists such as Chagall, Corne or Hartung. Of course there are completely incorpendent printmakers too . . . artists who pursue creative goals in their own studios.

In Paris today there exists a very special climate of fervor in printmaking. Whether in black and white or color; in intaglio, relief or planographic form; prints displayed in studios, on gallery walls or stacked in portfolios or print cases; original printmaking—practiced more and more today—draws upon and borrows from tradition . . . but also presents a new audacity.

Printmaking is incontestably one of the great glories of the School of Paris and of France. We French are happy and proud to see again our prints, in ever new and most vital forms, so graciously received by our American friends.
